## Our faculty and you


UTS Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences (FASS) has over 100 academic staff and some 140 HDR students, and we put evidence-based innovation, investigative rigour, and collaborative creativity at the core of our research.

We believe in the power of research that directly benefits communities and stakeholders. Our researchers address problems and enrich public understandings around diverse domains, including:

- Indigenous identities, communities, and land justice;
- diversity, equity, and social inclusion;
- political and cultural understandings of the Asia Pacific region;
- environmental justice and climate change;
- transformations in creative industries, including film, television, music, sound and literature;
- best practices in policing and community safety;
- and new approaches to education and literacy in international contexts (among others).

Our researchers create impact through diverse forms of research communication. FASS has developed an international reputation for non-traditional research, which includes documentaries, novels, biographies, teaching toolkits, community events, public exhibitions, and audio-visual artistic works. HDR students are invited to propose non-traditional components within their research projects, and to be adventurous in finding ways to enhance impact through creative, playful, and experimental approaches to communicating research findings.

To support our HDR students, we provide diverse forms of ongoing research training to help build disciplinary confidence and knowledge. This training includes academic writing support, methods training around qualitative and quantitative research, reading groups, research seminar series, writing boot camps, and panel-based feedback on students' work in progress.







## Our research, your supervisors

FASS is a community of over 100 researchers and educators. We're organised into four research centres and seven research groups across the School of Communication and the School of International Studies and Education.

Our expertise spans multiple disciplines, making us among the most diverse communities at UTS, and we're widely known for our capacity to connect rigorous research findings to innovative forms of research communication, including a substantial presence from FASS experts across Australian news media and public policy debates.

In FASS, our academics provide excellent supervision for graduate research degrees, including many senior researchers who specialise in supervising interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary research projects. We provide a highly supportive environment for research degree students, including research training through our highly-rated module on Academic Research Practices that HDR students complete in their first semester. Our supervisors have also won university-level UTS Vice Chancellor's Award for Research Excellence in graduate research supervision in 2020 (Dr. Bhuva Narayan) and 2021 (Dr. llaria Vanni).

#### Life-wide Learning and Education Research Group (LLERG)



The group engages with the dynamic platforms, publics, and challenges of contemporary media contexts.










#### Centre for the Advancement of Indigenous Knowledges (CAIK)

CAIK is a group of Indigenous researchers and ally scholars in FASS who conduct research intended to benefit Indigenous Australians. This research supports Indigenous peoples' rightful place in the nation, foregrounds Indigenous knowledges and experiences, and contributes to challenging systemic racism, transforming institutions such as universities and museums, and re-imagining the national narrative on Indigenous-settler relations to improve outcomes for Indigenous communities.





Doctor of Philosophy (PhD) will enable you to become an independent researcher.

With the guidance of a supervisory team, you'll undertake a research project, and produce an 80,000 - 100,000-word thesis (or equivalent including creative work) and develop advanced research skills and knowledge in your chosen field. The thesis is a substantial document that makes an original contribution to your field of research. Your thesis may also involve a non-traditional format, such as a creative practice or practice-led output. You have a choice to do research in collaboration with industry through an Industry Doctoral Programme if you have an industry sponsor. In Australia, you can fast track your PhD and finish within 3.5 years, though it normally will take you 4 years full time and 8 years part-time.

You'll need a strong academic background and you will need to submit a research proposal and other documents to support your application.

For International Applicants only. You can join our doctoral degree program without moving abroad. Our PhDs are available in distance mode, an option that allows you to follow your aspiration to be a PhD researcher without disrupting your lifestyle, family, and work. There is no need to apply for and obtain a student visa, and you will also save on accommodation, travel, and other relocation costs. You may also be eligible for a tuition-fee offset scholarship if your application is scored highly on admission. All other application processes for a PhD by Distance are the same as those for on-campus PhD applications. For more information, visit the PhD by Distance webpage.

Additionally, you can also enrol in our collaborative doctoral programmes or our co-tutelle programmes if you'd like to have a thesis supervisor in your own country alongside a PhD at UTS.

**Master of Arts (Research)** is an internationally recognised graduate research degree.

With guidance from your supervisory team, you will undertake a significant research project and complete either a 40,000 - 50,000-word thesis, or a non-traditional thesis that involves a dissertation and a creative work. The MA (Research) will take you 1.5 to 2 years to complete full time and will enable you to develop advanced knowledge and methodologies.

MA (Research) work is conducted independently and you will need a strong academic background to apply. You will need to submit a research proposal and other documents to support your application.

Many MA (Research) candidates choose to continue with their research in order to obtain a PhD.

# Funding for our research degrees

Our UTS scholarships search tool provides you access to scholarships by course type. Additionally,

- All accepted Domestic students will automatically receive the RTP Tuition Offset Scholarship from UTS. This covers the cost of their tuition fees valued at \$30,000 per year for up to the maximum period of time allowable to complete their study (Doctoral degree 4 years full time or 8 years part time for domestic students.)
- In addition to the RTP Tuition Offset Scholarship above, the University makes an additional contribution in the form of enhanced training and facilities that contribute to the research degree program.
- Domestic and International applicants may also receive a scholarship stipend on a competitive basis, to the value of \$32 500 per year. The full-time scholarship is tax free, but the part-time scholarship is potentially taxable.

- 4. Admitted international students who successfully secure a scholarship stipend will also receive a Tuition Offset Scholarship for 3.5 years full-time, providing that their application documents and proposal achieve a sufficient score in the scholarships ranking, and that they meet Englishlanguage proficiency requirements.
- FASS provides various types of support for resources, conference registration and travel, and other services connected to thesis research, in addition to thesis support funding provided by the Graduate Research School.
- For students whose projects focus on children and young people there are Rosemary Johnston HDR Scholarships. One of the two supervisors needs to be in the Education discipline as a current or honorary staff member.

Shannon Foster is a D'harawal Knowledge Keeper, artist and interdisciplinary creative practitioner with over twenty years of experience in designing

education programs and spaces in prominent learning institutions. As a registered Traditional Owner of the now-Sydney region, Shannon has expertise in cultural practices, history and ceremony; in ecological and botanical knowledges of local eco-systems as well as Indigenous Research Methodologies, and Aboriginal languages. Shannon is currently completing her doctoral thesis with the Centre for the Advancement of Indigenous Knowledges at UTS where she is researching D'harawal Storytelling Methodology and the Narinya (Living Dreaming) of her Elders as Traditional Custodians of the now-Sydney Basin and surrounds.

Indra is a 3rd year PhD in Communications. She has enjoyed

being part of the UTS community by working at the university's Library, Information Technology Division, Learning Experience Lab, as a Casual Tutor, and has been a Student Representative on the Academic and Research School Boards. **Fievel Tong** 

'A critical discourse analysis of the under-representation of people with trisomy 21 (Down syndrome) in Australian post-secondary education contexts'

Inclusive post-secondary education for people with trisomy 21 (Down syndrome) in Australia is a relatively new area of development. Many people with Down syndrome express interest in, and potential for, further education. Fievel's research foregrounds the voices and lived experiences of these people in the area of post-secondary education, with the hope of contributing towards the growth of such learning opportunities for this minority group.



**Monica Galassi** 

'Aboriginal Archives in Italy.
A space for reciprocal
collaboration' (in collaboration
with Jumbunna Institute).

Monica's research relates to international debate on rights over access, management and repatriation of cultural artefacts and material, many of them unknown to Aboriginal communities in Australia. In particular, records in Italy and the Vatican are little known among First Australians and difficult to access because of the barriers of language, the record-keeping practices of Italian institutions, multiple layers of power and interests, and no agreed framework to manage access and/or return records to their communities of origin. This research project facilitates digital access to records, and promotes reciprocal and collaborative research.



**Anne Casey** 

The Second-Wave Impact in Australia of the Great Irish Famine

Blending archival research and reclaiming undocumented oral history, Anne's thesis explores the

history of Australia's first refugees - families who fled the Great Irish Famine (1845-1849). Revealing new discoveries from research into the intergenerational impacts in Australia of the Irish Famine, this thesis utilises poetry and creative non-fiction to tell the human story behind the history. Anne's poetry based on her PhD research has won national and international awards and one of her poems has been selected by NASA to be sent on a Moon mission for astronauts to read and also deposit in a time capsule on the Moon.

The UTS campus is located on Gadigal Country, in the area known today as Broadway, within Sydney's growing education, innovation and creative hub at the southern gateway to Sydney's central business district.
