Northern Rivers Urban Agriculture and Sustainable Food Futures Roundtable

In 2023, rising living costs in Australia contributed to increasing food insecurity with 36% of Australians struggling to put food on the table. In the Northern Rivers, floods, bushfires and the COVID pandemic made this region's food system one of the most vulnerable in Australia.

In June 2023, the <u>Northern Rivers Food</u>
<u>Security Scoping Study</u> documented an understanding of regional food networks, identified food security challenges and opportunities during recent disaster events and provided recommendations for developing greater resilience within the regional food system.

On November 2nd 2023 the Living Lab Northern Rivers, hosted a community forum to begin dialogue on these recommendations to identify adaptable and resilient food futures for the region. This was attended by over 60 community stakeholders. On November 28th 2023, 65 stakeholders from government, First Nations, community and industry, gathered at this roundtable to continue the conversation. Sponsored by Business NSW, Indigenous Futures Foundation and Northern Rivers Community Gateway and took place on Bundjalung country at the Ballina Surf Club as part of the Sustain 2023 Urban Agriculture Month. The following questions were addressed through presentations, a panel and participatory workshops:

- What are the key challenges to the Northern Rivers food and farming system from health to climate adaptation, food security and reconstruction?
- What roles do key stakeholders play in addressing these challenges?
- What does participatory food system governance look like for the Northern Rivers region?



Executive Summary

Key challenges

Participants highlighted several key challenges facing the Northern Rivers food system:

- **Food insecurity:** lack of access to food, high price of food and cost of living crisis pushing marginalised populations to rely on food relief services
- Supermarket dependency / pricing: lack of locally-owned access to local produce, reliance on out-of-state produce, supermarkets squeezing farmers on price
- Land use conflicts / urban sprawl: competing land uses from population shift in the region leading to loss of farmland
- Disasters / supply chain disruptions: compounding disasters (floods, bushfires, COVID)
- **High land prices / high costs of farming:** acting as a barrier to entry for new / young producers and increased vulnerability with high energy / fuel prices
- Unsustainable forms of production: monocultures / poor land management practices
- Lack of skills & training: no extension support from DPI / no pathways for new farmers
- Lack of coordination: no overall cohesive, integrated or supported mechanism to address these challenges

Key recommendations

Participants then identified ways forward to address these challenges:

- Local and regional food systems frameworks and coordination: participants called for establishment of a community-led regional food coalition/council to develop a regional food plan, supported by government & key legislative, planning and financing frameworks
- Diversity, inclusiveness and representation: the regional food system plan and its governance should be multi-sectoral and representative of all key stakeholders
- Participation of marginalised voices: ensure that the voices and perspectives of First Nations people, children and young people, people with disabilities, people experiencing food insecurity and older people are heard and facilitated in this regional framework
- Support from State and Federal alongside regional/ local government: While the process begins with community-ownership, this work requires local government support but current lack of resourcing locally means state and federal governments are important to provide system-wide planning and funding



Policy context

NSW

This Roundtable took place just over a year after the Environment and Planning Committee delivered its report into <u>Food Production and Supply in NSW</u>. Key recommendations included:

- Comprehensive statewide Food System Plan for NSW: covering a) strategies to tackle food insecurity b) equitable access to good food c) food production including urban agriculture d) changes to planning frameworks e) integration with local government
- A NSW Food System and Food Security Council: to implement the Plan, with multistakeholder membership including First Nations and food producers
- Proper measurement of food security and nutrition: comprehensive surveys covering NSW's diverse communities including First Nations and Culturally & Linguistically Diverse
- **Key role for local government**: NSW government to support local councils to develop and implement local food strategies and provide appropriate funding
- Make land available for urban agriculture: Amend planning frameworks to allocate underused Crown land for urban and community agriculture projects

Federal

After the Roundtable concluded, the House Standing Committee on Agriculture related its report on a year-long inquiry into food security in Australia: *Australian Food Story*. The report contained 35 recommendations including:

Standing Committee on Agriculture

- A comprehensive National Food Plan
- A Minister for Food
- A National Food Council
- Fairness between actors in the food system
- **Develop urban agriculture:** The Federal government to work with State, Territory and local governments to develop urban agriculture, with a focus on building skills and encouraging careers in agriculture
- Protect farmland from urban sprawl
- Funding to support sustainable agriculture
- Support communities to improve localised food systems

The Federal government's response is expected before June 2024.

Subsequently, in the wake of reports of record profits posted by the major supermarkets and continuing high prices for fresh produce, the Federal government announced a Senate Inquiry into Supermarket Pricing. The Inquiry will deliver its report by May 2024.


Following the presentations participants split up into smaller groups to engage in a reflective dialogue **Socratic circle** process. In this format group conversation took a democratic approach to sharing ideas, teasing out issues and generating productive conversations with participants. Three Socratic circles were formed, with each exploring first the challenges and actions, and secondly participatory governance frameworks and ideas. The circles were facilitated by (see Appendix for bios):

- 1. Nick Rose, Sustain
- 2. Fiona Berry, UTS Institute for Sustainable Futures
- 3. Sheriden Keegan, Griffith University

A facilitator and scribe captured the flow of the conversation using a 'web' diagram to track when conversation became stuck, providing a visual prompt to create spaces for others.

Participants

The Roundtable participants represented a diverse cross section of stakeholders from the Northern Rivers food system including representatives from government, industry, not for profit and community sectors. Invitees travelled to attend the Roundtable in Ballina from across the seven Local Government Areas of the Northern Rivers and beyond.



Roundtable Participatory Workshop - findings

Challenges and actions

Key prompting questions were asked of participants in the circles including:

- What are some of the key challenges facing the food system in your community?
- Are these particular to your community or shared across the region?
- Are these challenges being addressed currently? If so, by whom and in what ways?
- What are some different ways to approach these challenges?

Participants highlighted several key challenges facing the Northern Rivers food system:

- Food insecurity: lack of access to food, high price of food and cost of living crisis pushing marginalised populations to rely on food relief services
- Supermarket dependency / pricing: lack of locally-owned access to local produce, reliance on out-of-state produce, supermarkets squeezing farmers on price
- Land use conflicts / urban sprawl: competing land uses from population shift in the region leading to loss of farmland



- Disasters / supply chain disruptions: compounding disasters (floods, bushfires, COVID)
- High land prices / high costs of farming: acting as a barrier to entry for new / young producers and increased vulnerability with high energy / fuel prices
- Unsustainable forms of production: monocultures / poor land management practices
- Lack of skills & training: no extension support from DPI / no pathways for new farmers
- Lack of coordination: no overall cohesive, integrated or supported mechanism to address these challenges



Key actions identified by participants to address these challenges included:

- **Small scale agriculture** that is diversified, sustainable and oriented to local markets
- Education such as TAFE horticulture courses, mentoring for young farmers and school food production curriculum
- Community food action including support for expanding farmers markets, community gardens and food sharing programs
- Local and circular food economy via innovative ideas and supported by planning frameworks
- Smart land use and business models to fund land leasing and food cooperatives
- Coordination of food security and disaster response, information and best practices e.g.
 Nimbin Community Plan & emergency food relief

Roundtable Participatory Workshop - findings (cont.)

Participatory and inclusive governance

Key prompting questions were asked of participants in the circles including:


- Do you feel that you have a say in the key decisions that affect the food system in your community?
- What forums / platforms exist for you / your organisation to participate in decisions about the food system?
- Who needs to be involved in the process for creating change, and how can they be engaged democratically in the process?
- What entrenched narratives do we need to change?
- What policies need to change or need to be developed?



Participants highlighted a number of opportunities for improving governance of the Northern Rivers food system and policy levers:

- A democratic community-led regional food coalition/council to develop a regional food plan, supported by government & key legislative, planning and financing frameworks
- Diversity, inclusiveness and representation: multi-sectoral (including agriculture, health, planning and social services) and representative of all key stakeholders, especially youth and children
- Resourcing of a coalition/council by state and federal governments to support regional and local system-wide planning and funding
- Providing evidence through collaborative information sharing through storytelling, workshops and meetings
- Local policy reform across land use planning and review of current mechanisms, with more support for small scale farms, urban agriculture and community food initiatives





Next Steps

Based on the findings of the Roundtable, key recommendations and next steps include:

- Local and regional food systems frameworks and coordination: participants called for the establishment of a community-led regional food network / coalition, supported by government and key legislative, planning and financing frameworks
 ACTIONS:
 - Local government advocacy e.g. Clarence Valley and Ballina Shire have passed Notice
 of Motions in Council since the Roundtable, urging state government support (see
 Appendix) and decisions to address food security before the next disaster
 - Regional advocacy e.g. Northern Rivers Joint Organisation and Regional
 Development Australia Northern Rivers to acknowledge food security as a significant issue and advocate for state and federal government support
 - Feasibility study of food system governance structure, SWOT analysis of past projects and legislation barriers e.g. FoodLinks (2009-2013), land use planning policy barriers
- **Diversity, inclusiveness and representation:** The regional food system governance framework should be multi-sectoral (across agriculture, planning, health and social services) and representative of all key stakeholders, with a particular emphasis on youth and children and including Indigenous voices and knowledge


ACTIONS:

- Working group formed from the stakeholders of the Roundtable, led by NNSWLHD
- Continued cross-sector food system and resilience collaboration (via workshops, roundtables, seminars) across the 7 Local government areas in the Northern Rivers via key agencies e.g. Business NSW, Northern Rivers Community Gateway, SCU
- State and Federal government must be involved: This work can't be left to local
 government which doesn't have the resources to support it properly. There are essential
 roles for both state and federal governments with system-wide planning and funding
 ACTIONS:
 - State MPs to write to State Government ministers (Agriculture, Health, Planning, Local Government, Disaster Response) for a response to <u>NSW Inquiry into Food</u> <u>Production and Supply</u> which recommends support for food security at a local level



With demand currently outstripping supply Rebecca believes the industry is at a critical point and needs to expand to ensure its survival. She is on a mission to educate more growers about the enormous potential of Australia's native foods and provide industry leaders with a platform to connect and share their stories. Rebecca wants to support First Nations Enterprise in the industry and hopes that one day, the industry will be First Nations led and have a majority of its operators First Nations people.



Jamie Cooper | Consortium of Neighbourhood Centres

Jamie is the Emergency Relief Coordinator for the Consortium of Neighbourhood Centres delivering referrals and resources for persons with an immediate need for financial and material aid across the Northern Rivers region. To the General Manager, Clarence Valley Council, I propose that the following report and notice of motion be submitted to Council.

SUMMARY

In November 2022, the NSW Government undertook an inquiry into food production and supply in NSW (report 3/57).

This inquiry was self-referred on 10 November 2021. That the Committee on Environment and Planning inquiry into and report on food production and supply in NSW, including improving food security, equitable access to food, reducing food waste and destruction.

The report highlighted food insecurity and a lack of equal access to nutritious food. NSW food production and supply systems face serious workforce challenges as well as the impacts from Natural Disasters for humans and livestock.

The inquiry made 65 recommendations that aim to address issues in the NSW food system some of these recommendations directly impact local councils.

The NSW Government and local Councils have an opportunity to tackle food insecurity and food waste which will bring significant environmental, social and health benefits by reducing our emissions, capitalising on opportunities to bolster the local food economy, and improving the health & wellbeing of our communities.

I am writing in regards to your government's overdue response to the Legislative Assembly Committee on Environment and Planning's inquiry into Food Production and Supply in NSW, which was tabled in Parliament on 1st November 2022.

Despite producing a significant amount of the state's agricultural output, an increasing number of people in my electorate of Ballina are facing food insecurity. Following the 2022 Northern Rivers Floods we experienced an acute food security crisis when farms, transport routes and cold storage facilities were inundated. As a result, supermarket shelves were empty for weeks on end and people had to rely on farmers markets to source fresh produce.

The inquiry's final report made several important recommendations in relation to addressing food insecurity, reducing food waste and the important role that community organisations play in strengthening the resilience of our food systems.

I am eagerly awaiting the government's response to this inquiry, which was due on 1st May 2023, and your plans to address the growing food insecurity crisis threatening regional NSW communities.

A local, seasonal and native foods inspired lunch was served by Casino-based and Indigenous-owned Twisted Tucker.





Shane Runciman is a Wiradjuri man passionate about building food security and education in the Northern Rivers and the owner of Kyogle-based Twisted Tucker.

Twisted Tucker provide wholesale bush tucker products, retail and catering services and deliver cooking programs within the community. Shane is passionate about preparing meals that are local, seasonal, ethical and and utilise native foods. He is a passionate gardener and in 2015 ran the Kyogle school canteen eliminating processed food while replacing it with local, healthy options influenced by Indigenous bush flavours. In 2021, Shane developed and delivered a 6 week 'Faster Food' cooking course with nutritionist Simon Gava which included authoring the accompanying book Faster Food by Twisted Tucker: 6 Week Cooking program for local young people in Casino.

This program has been delivered 14 times across the region. Shane has been involved in gardening programs, one which saw 42 long term unemployed Aboriginal men participate at Lismore community gardens, with 39 gaining full time employment, mainly with Ngullingar Land Council.

During the 2022 floods Shane co-ordinated 3500 meals to be cooked and delivered across the region with 50 volunteers, local growers, and Kyogle High School cooking facilities.
