

UTS Prize Conditions of Award David Toolan Memorial Prize

Faculty: Law

This document sets out the conditions of award for the below prize ('Prize') and the obligations of recipients ('Recipient') and UTS in regards to this Prize. The administrative processes to support awarding this Prize will be managed, and may be amended, in accordance with UTS Rules, Policy and Procedures.

1. PRIZE NAME: David Toolan Memorial Prize

2. PURPOSE

To recognise the best performing student in subject 76007 International Human Rights Law.

3. VALUE AND BENEFIT

3.1 Number of Recipients:

Usually, one (1) Recipient will be awarded the Prize at the end of each academic year.

3.2 Benefit/s to Recipient:

The value of the Prize to the Recipient is \$500. The Recipient will also receive a certificate of award.

3.3 Payment of benefit/s:

- The Recipient will receive one payment of \$500; and
- A certificate of award which will be presented to the Recipient at the annual UTS Faculty of Law Awards Ceremony. If the Recipient is unable to attend the ceremony, alternative arrangements will be made.

4. ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

The Recipient must be enrolled in a UTS award course and have received a result in subject 76007 International Human Rights Law¹ in the academic year for which the prize is being awarded.

5. RECIPIENT SELECTION CRITERIA

- The prize will be awarded to the student who achieves the highest aggregate mark in subject 76007 International Human Rights Law in the relevant academic year.
- In the event that two or more eligible students have the same highest aggregate mark, the following criteria will be considered (in priority order):
 - a. Performance in subject 76007 International Human Rights Law outside of formal assessment that demonstrates mastery of and engagement in the subject;
 - b. No previous attempts of subject 76007 International Human Rights Law;
 - c. Overall academic performance in the student's course, including GPA, whether the student has failed other subjects, received academic cautions or had a finding of misconduct against them.

6. SELECTION

 The student(s) with the highest aggregate mark will be identified by Progressions, Results & Conferral (SAU) according to the eligibility and recipient selection criteria as provided in clause 4 and 5.

If 76007 International Human Rights Law is not offered in the academic year and the donor nominates another subject in its place, the Prize will be awarded to the student who receives the highest aggregate mark in the nominated subject according to the eligibility and selection criteria and selection process identified in these Conditions of Award.

- In the event that two or more eligible students have the same highest final mark, a selection committee of a minimum of two (2) people will select a Recipient based on the specified selection criteria in clause 5;
- The endorsed Recipient will then be formally approved or declined by Faculty of Law Board based upon the selection criteria in clauses 5 and 7.

7. OTHER CONDITIONS

- The Faculty of Law Board may decline to offer the award to a recipient who achieves the highest aggregate mark where the mark is less than 75.
- If 76007 International Human Rights Law is not offered in the academic year for which the prize is to be awarded, then the donor may:
 - o Nominate another subject for that academic year; or
 - o Decline to offer the award; or
 - Come to any other mutually satisfactory arrangement with UTS in respect of the prize.
